Field Work

- Staff has been working hard on keeping the Hills in good condition. We continue to rake out tire tracks, pick up trash, install missing signs and post, plant vertical mulch, and educate the public.
- On January 19th, we installed a new Alabama Hills National Scenic Area sign at the South Entrance with members of the Alabama Hills Stewardship Group. Thank you to everyone who braved the cold and came out.
- We received a record amount of precipitation in Payahuunadu, Owens Valley, which greatly impacted roads in the Alabama Hills. Movie Road was completely washed out and has been repaired. Some roads off of Movie Road are quite rutted out and may be impassible. Please drive with caution.




December Visitation




- Movie Road: 3,318

Staffing

- The BLM Recreation Department has 5 permanent and 4 seasonal team members that patrol the Alabama Hills and other BLM-managed lands. 1 law enforcement officer is specifically assigned to the Alabama Hills to assist with overnight use compliance. 1 new seasonal has joined the team and will be focused on the Alabama Hills.
- ESIA has Savanna as an Interpretive Specialist who patrols Alabama Hills 3-5 days a week.
- ESIA has 2 new Bishop Climbing Rangers, Matt and Casey. They primarily patrol the Bishop Climbing Areas but will help rove the climbing areas in the Alabama Hills. Read More about the Bishop Climbing Rangers Program.
- The National Park Service (NPS) has 2 rangers assisting in the Lone Pine Visitor Center and focusing on interpretive ranger programs in the Hills.
