
Alabama Hills National Scenic Area Newsletter, April 2023



Field Work

- On Friday nights, the Alabama Hills staff hosts a table in the evenings to encourage campers to make the right choices on their visit. Much of the camping has been filling up by 4pm on Friday nights and staff makes approximently 50 contacts.
- Tuttle Creek Campground (BLM) has been full many weekends in April. Lone Pine Campground is currently closed.
- Staff have been enjoying the spectacular wildflower show in the Hills. There are appearances from scarlet locoweed, desert paintbrush, Mojave desert parsley, desert peppergrass, apricot globemallow, and evening snow.
- Jesse Plum, BLM photographer, visited the Alabama Hills and other areas managed by the BLM Field Office. He took photos of landscapes and of rangers and staff working.
 We look forward to seeing his photos!
- Movie Road is back open and repaired- thank you Inyo County! Many BLM-managed roads that spur off Movie Road have also been extremely rutted from water.
 Currently, there is no vehicle access to the Cattle Pocket Area and there is no estimated time for repair. Folks can now access Paul's Paradise.
- New "Camping Information" signs have been installed on Movie Road! These signs
 direct Northbound traffic to the information kiosk near the Shark Fin and the Mobius
 Arch trailhead.
- The BLM, ESIA, and the Alabama Hills Stewardship Group all attended the 10th Annual Lone Pine Tribal Earth Day on Saturday, April 29th. The BLM had a trash decomposition game, ESIA had dark sky information, and the stewardship gave out information about the Alabama Hills. Each table talked to more than 60 people and had a great time! Thank you Lone Pine Tribe!

- Staff have been working hard to rake out tracks, install signs, educate visitors about the importance of staying on designated roads, monitor camping behavior and hosting interpertive tables.
- We have a "soft" opening for Camping Agreements in the Alabama Hills! Camping
 Agreements are encouraged for designated camping in the Alabama Hills.
 Agreements are free and do not guarantee a campsite- all camping is first come, first
 serve. This is an acknowledgment that campers understand the rules and guidance for



Staffing

- The BLM Recreation Department has 5 permanent and 4 seasonal team members
 that patrol the Alabama Hills and other BLM-managed lands. 1 law enforcement
 officer is specifically assigned to the Alabama Hills to assist with overnight use
 compliance. Welcome to the team Philip Gross the new Assistant Field Manager for
 the Recreation, Lands and Facilities, and Neal Craig as the Assistant Field Manager for
 Biophysical.
- ESIA has Savanna as an Interpretive Specialist who patrols Alabama Hills 3-5 days a week.
- ESIA has one Bishop Climbing Ranger. They primarily patrol the Bishop Climbing Areas but will help rove the climbing areas in the Alabama Hills. Read More about the Bishop Climbing Rangers Program. The climbing ranger season ends in mid-May.
- The National Park Service (NPS) and the USFS are welcoming seasonals in the Lone Pine Visitor Center starting mid-May.
